

The main purpose of the ACA-accreditation program is to educate camp owners and directors in the administration of key aspects of camp operation, particularly those related to program quality and the health and safety of campers and staff. The standards establish guidelines for needed policies, procedures, and practices. The camp, then, is responsible for on-going implementation of these policies.

The second purpose of ACA accreditation is to assist the public in selecting camps that meet industry-accepted and governmentrecognized standards. ACA's camp database provides the public with eleven separate ways to search for the ideal ACA-accredited camp.

The idea was to use the most abundant and lucrative resource in the area to raise much needed funds for local ministries... farmland.

The first step was to get the area churches on board and decide on a name, Harvest for Kids North Dakota. The next step was to decide on the benefactors and to educate them. Since Park River Bible Camp, Cooperstown Bible Camp, and FaHoCha Bible Camp all serve the area churches, Harvest for Kids North Dakota decided to give the proceeds resulting in the eventual harvest to those camps as well as to Children's Camp International.

Before all of this happened, though, some area farmers agreed to donate a portion of their acreage to the cause. All told, 70 acres was planted with soybeans and corn. Some of the seed was donated by Pioneer (20 acres of corn and 20 acres of soybean), and the rest was donated by the farmers themselves.

After battling a wet spring, all 70 acres of land was planted, and according to reports, is doing well considering the amounts of rain the area has endured. If all continues to go according to plan, the harvest will occur on October 22nd alongside a harvest festival with food, fellowship, and live music. As stated above, earnings from the harvest will be divided among the three camps serving the churches in the Northwood area, something for which Park River Bible Camp is extremely grateful. From the Director's Desk

"Grape gramma meeting. Wake up grape gramma!"
These were the words of my son when he saw my grandmother lying in her casket at the family viewing the day before her funeral. For those who don't speak my son's brand of two year old, "meeting" is his way of saying "sleeping". It was a bitter sweet moment. Bitter because as much as we may have wished it, we knew she was not sleeping, but had finally succumbed to her long battle with diabetes.

But my son's comment, formed out of his blissful ignorance of death, was sweet because it reminded me of the hope God gives us through Paul's words to the Thessalonians in 1 Thessalonians 4:13-14.

"But we do not want you to be uninformed, brothers, about those who are asleep, that you may not grieve as others do who have no hope. For since we believe that Jesus died and rose again, even so, through Jesus, God will bring with him those who have fallen asleep."

In the days of the early church, those Christians who died were referred to as only having fallen asleep. The

early believers understood that through Christ's resurrection, they too would be raised to new life, and that their new life would include a bodily resurrection, just as Christ too was raised.

So even though my son's words were sweet, they held no authority. But Christ's words *do* have authority because "death is swallowed up in victory." Through the death and resurrection of Christ, our hope can indeed be prophesied through the mouths of babes.
